

In Ethiopia, more than 2 million youth enter the labor market annually. However, the national economy cannot generate adequate jobs that can absorb these unemployed youths. The International Centre of Insect Physiology and Ecology (*icipe*) and the Mastercard Foundation, together with public and private sector partners, initiated the More Young Entrepreneurs in Silk and Honey (MOYESH) Programme that aims to create dignified and fulfilling jobs for 100,000 unemployed young women and men.

This edition presents a summary of the major milestones and latest updates.



Since the programme launch in October 2019, about 102,565 (60% women) youth have been recruited, trained, and provided business starter kits in apiculture and sericulture



Over 25 thousand additional direct jobs were also created at partnering input and service provider small enterprises that extended their businesses by tapping into the growing market opportunities



1,457 tons of table honey and 222 tons of silk products were produced by Year 1, Year 2 and Year 3 youth enterprises



Youth generated ETB 414 million (USD 8 million) income from beekeeping, silkworm farming and complementary income-generating businesses





About MOYESH

MOYESH Programme aims to "secure dignified and fulfilling direct job opportunities and income for 100, 000 unemployed youth (60% women)" through providing appropriate knowledge and skills and enabling them to establish beekeeping and sericulture business enterprises. The programme will have further positive impacts on 14.6 million people along the honey and silk value chains through multiplier effects. MOYESH (moyesh.icipe.org) is a five-year programme (October 2019-October 2024) implemented in Amhara, Oromia, and Southern Nations, Nationalities Peoples' regions by *icipe* (icipe.org) in partnership with the Mastercard Foundation (mastercardfdn.org), and several other public and private sector partners.

Through such public events, the programme raises awareness and contributes to improving the domestic and international market opportunities and attracts additional investment and policy attention to the apiculture and sericulture sectors as well as youth centered initiatives. This year, youth enterprises and input suppliers supported by the MOYESH programme have presented their products during the World Bee Day observed on 20 May 2023 in Banga town of the South West Ethiopia People's region. Our scholars were also invited and shared their thoughts on the theme "Bee Engaged in Pollinator free agricultural production". On 10 February 2023, a stakeholders' experiences sharing visit was held at the sericulture development site in Adami Tulu, East Shewa Zone of Oromia Region, Ethiopia. It was a very productive event, that brought together key stakeholders to share practical learning and key results in the sericulture development intervention. Government officials and policy makers at different levels (Federal, Oromia region, zone and district) attended and interacted with the organized sericulture youth enterprises, private sector partners and spoke to the media.

Impact Stories

icipe contributes to national strategic development priorities and private sector engagement in youth empowerment and job creation

Building upon the lessons learned and experiences gained over the years, we extended our outreach through the MOYESH Programme to 77 districts across the country. Our adaptive programme management, soft skills and technical training and innovative business models, such as the marketplaces and integrated business hubs we established inspired the government and development partners to initiate more efforts that empower young people and create decent jobs. Partners are very vocal about our contributions to promoting current national and regional development priorities and strategies. For example, *Yelemat Tirufat* planned to establish 2,000 honey villages across the country and the Oromia Region Honey initiative seeks to support 60,000 experienced beekeepers to expand their beekeeping businesses using frame hives.

Our strong public-private partnership, multiple youth engagement approaches and fruitful collaborations with financial institutions, and service providers open additional business and job creation opportunities. Microfinance Institutions are opening new branches in the programme intervention areas and providing access to loans tailored to apiculture and sericulture developments. Similarly, our support helps small and medium enterprises (SMEs), honey producers, processors, and traders to flourish in domestic and international markets. Further to the piloting and promotion of digital financial services, for the first time, packed and labelled table honey and finished silk garments produced by youth partners are traded through e-commerce, linking producers directly to the consumers. The widely disseminated information and knowledge in integrated beekeeping and sericulture development influenced rural communities to adopt aspects of the technology package that suits them (https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=t7zZCyzn6is, https://youtu.be/VPgTVanwm2U).



Impact Stories

icipe and partners take major steps in job creation and reducing forced migration

Lack of employment opportunities is one of the major factors for youth migration in Ethiopia. Ample beholding stories indicated that our youth-centered efforts address this challenge and effectively reduced youth migration flows in some areas. For example, most members of the Hafiz, Abde, Jebelu and Friends' beekeeping enterprise comprising of 6 female and 4 male youths in the Setema district are returnees from Middle East countries, who have succeeded in achieving their economic independence after joining the MOYESH programme. They supply quality processed honey, bread and coffee seedling for the local market and already influenced many others to follow in their footsteps. Correspondingly, youth partners in the Alle district, Frew, Adise and Friends' beekeeping enterprise also emerged as young entrepreneurs. This enterprise purchased a tractor with ETB2.7 million (USD50,943) and produced exportable wheat of about 200 quintals. Others like Niway, Temesgen and their Friends' enterprise in West Dembiya, Amhara region, attained the best results by producing 463 kg of honey in a single harvest. All the youth enterprises have already started harvesting on a large scale and supplying honey and beeswax for traders, like Green Face PLC and Oda Share Company. In addition, an enormous volume of silk cocoon and yarn are also ready for the potential niche market.

icipe paves the way for the beekeeping and sericulture input suppliers to flourish in Ethiopia

We understand the fundamental roles of SMEs in job creation and economic development of the country. Thus, we provide lasting solutions for SMEs to expand their business and achieve greater gains in apiculture and sericulture businesses. So far, we created direct jobs for 25,066 youths and transformed their work and creativity through technical skills development training.
